From Toronto, with Love presents 24 vintage suitcases, each unique and transformed by individual artists working in diverse mediums.

Originally destined to carry medical supplies from Toronto to remote clinics, these suitcases were found unsuitable for this and repurposed for art by individual volunteer artists reflecting on the idea of journeys, destinations, and the privileges and limitations of health care at home and abroad.

Viewers are invited to draw upon and sign the "guest book" suitcases, which will be used by *Not Just Tourists Toronto* (NJT) to continue forging connections through travel.

Not Just Tourists Toronto is a non-political, non-religious organization, which prevents the waste of usable medical supplies, collecting donations from Toronto's hospitals and medical suppliers. Participating travellers are given suitcases filled with hospital-grade supplies to deliver to places in need.




C. Elizabeth BestMy Fear of Going Missing





Though I have been living in Canada for many years, what I experienced in Iran as a child and a young adult still has a great influence in all aspects of my art and life. My goal is for people who look at my work to see the world through my eyes.



"Every 2.5 seconds a preventable death occurs.

Most Canadians take health care for granted. Meanwhile, 13 million people globally die every year of easily treatable conditions such as diarrhea, pneumonia, and malaria. The majority are children aged 5 or younger, who die needlessly due to lack of basic health care. Something as simple as a clean bandage can save a life. We need to change this statistic. This work was interrupted by the artist's intense health challenges and shows us just a glimpse of his original vision still in progress. It is a testament to his strength and courage.


"My design tells the story of the birth of NJT Kingston on one side, and my story of creating a documentary about wheelchair accessible travel on the other." www. drewcumpson.com

Drew Cumpson suffered a spinal cord injury in 2011 that left him C4 ventilator dependent and quadriplegic with no movement below the shoulders. He started the Kingston chapter of NJT in 2017. Drew enjoyed painting prior to his accident, and a year after his accident he began to teach himself mouthpainting. "It is not easy to do, and it takes a lot of patience through learning and doing to be able to create artistic pieces."



"Transporting surplus medical supplies around the world fosters healthy growth. It is called 'Flourish'. Word Origin & History c.1300, 'to blossom, grow,' from Old French floriss-, stem of florir 'blossom, flower, bloom, flourish,' from Latin florere 'to bloom, blossom, flower,' figuratively 'to flourish, be prosperous,' from flos 'a flower." www.CatherineGutsche.com

I love to experiment with mixed media and imagery, mostly in an abstract fashion with bold forms and colour. Painting whatever inspires me at the moment. I incorporate fabric, beads, buttons, found objects, wire, and objects from nature into mostly acrylic paintings. I paint until I believe I am finished, then I step back, return to the canvas and paint some more. ... After a few days I make up my mind if the work should be signed or turned to the left and worked some more. When enough is enough, I sign it and hang it.



"Travellers on surface (islands, seas) connected by common roots below and within. Inspired by John Donne 'No man is an island...' To a very privileged WASP who has known no hunger or war or serious injury, the people who suffer these may seem far distant and somewhat alien."

Born in New Brunswick, raised in Montréal, I studied in the US, worked and travelled in BC and Europe, then settled in Toronto in the 1970s, working as a graphic and web designer and developer. Since retiring in 2009, I completed the Visual Arts Certificate at The Art Centre and classes at Toronto School of Art. I paint to celebrate moments or places and the meanings that they have for me. I may begin painting 'en plein air,' often I just sketch, and then paint from that experience later, if the subject niggles at me to "Go on, there's a story."



Colectivo

"Colectivo is an ode to local collective buses and to the folk art of weaving. The suitcase is a representation of a bus, with the seat built as a replica of a backstrap loom, a typical loom used by weavers in various Latin American countries. Colectivos are the ultimate window into local culture: a universal way to get around [and so] essential for healthcare treatment." www.barbarakowalski.ca

Barbara Kowalski is a graphic designer from Toronto who recently gave up a permanent address in favour of traveling the world. From visiting weavers in small Bolivian villages to taking classes with local artists in Chile, Cuba and Mexico, art has provided some of the strongest insights into local cultures and history and most meaningful connections on past travels. "Before creating this piece I went on a vacation. While packing for it, I reflected on the hundreds of suitcases packed previously and the emotions they evoked in the process. It became apparent how different packing my suitcase for this vacation felt rather than the suitcases I had packed for medical relief. It felt like everything that went in the suitcase was due to my mass consumption and personal use, rather than helping another. The art piece was made to portray the emptiness of a suitcase packed for a vacation."

Dana works at a startup by day, and creates at night. Whether it's an interior-design project, painting, or sculpting she always has a project on the go. Dana uses mixed media for her art. Her love of design started as a child competing in the Markham Fair & Ontario Horticultural Society, and it has stayed with her as an adult.



Having lived and worked in over 9 countries, Mr Richter has seen that different cultures imagine, create and build architecture in profoundly different ways. Working with simple materials and found objects, Mr. Richter creates objects that are simple yet complicated, to find themes that cross borders created by language, religion or tradition.

"This work is an attempt to reclaim and repurpose materials that I use in my commercial work, briefly retaining some of the energy that was spent to produce them. Each ingredient has its own backstory and hundreds if not thousands of hours that led to its condition before it is reclaimed and repurposed here, much like the suitcase that holds them."

My works explore the inorganic, bringing things to life by infusing them with nature. I am particularly interested in the found object and transforming every day perceptions of objects into the unexpected and the extraordinary. The subject of the scene often naturally contains composition, a pattern of light and dark, of shape and form, of colour and contrast and that is what captures my imagination and gets my creative juices flowing. The art I make is not particularly serious, there's always a wink, a nod and a grin.







"Using the suitcase as a symbol of the space of belonging we carry within us, this artwork invites the audience to reflect on the meaning of home. A child of war and displacement, my own story has been marked by transitions from and in between spaces, borders and lands. What to take and what to leave behind is a question that dominated my existence for long periods of time. For many of us whose lives have been shaped by displacement, home is a complex proposition and belonging is a constantly fluctuating state of yearning."


